

The format of the exam.

- The exam will have two parts.
- Part 1 covers ideas, theories, and arguments we've seen in our readings and videos. Each answer should be about 150 words. And you will be given ten questions, and you choose any FIVE to answer. The ten questions are fairly evenly distributed across the modules, with roughly 2 questions from each module. The questions will be somewhat general. For an example, a question might be of the following sort: "Explain why Tim Wu thinks we should impose net neutrality."
- Part 2 asks for your reasoned opinion using ideas and concepts we've covered. You will be given four questions, and you can choose any ONE to answer. These questions will resemble our discussion questions.

Studying

- I would recommend studying and focusing only on **three or four** modules, and not on all six modules. If you study three or four modules, you will know enough to answer five questions of your choice in part 1 and definitely at least one in part 2.
- I have reopened homework forums for week 3 and 4, so you can take advantage of other students' answers in the homework questions. You can quickly scan for better answers for those that are rated more highly.
- I will also soon reopen the homework forums for week 5, after I've counted the number of posts each student has made.
- The discussion forums, as opposed to the homework forums, all remain open for your perusal.

I have tried to make the exam fair and not too difficult. There was a lot of material covered in the course, and I do not expect you to remember all of it. I hope that this exam format will provide enough flexibility for you to focus on the readings and topics you find more interesting while you study.
